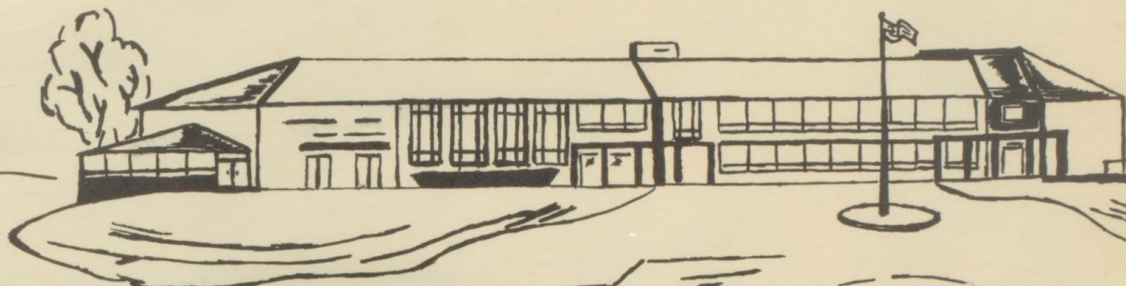

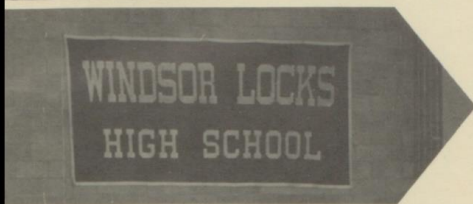


THE CLASS OF 1963 IN KALEIDOSCOPE

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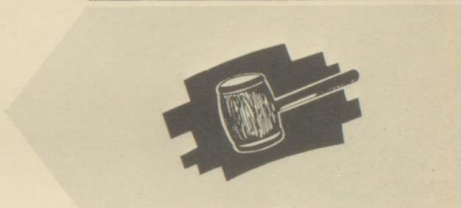
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A New Look at the American Heritage

Each era makes different demands upon Americans. The manner in which successive generations of Americans have risen to challenges forms our proud and dynamic heritage. In the future, each of the seniors of 1963 will be called upon to make his contribution, large or small, to his nation's future. The needs, qualities, and ideals that have motivated Americans in the past may well guide each senior in the course that he and, indeed, his country must follow.

During our earliest history, the demands of settlement in the harsh but fertile New World bred strong self-sufficiency in America's colonists. Only small groups of dedicated and daring persons, however, had the initiative and determination to formulate the Declaration of Independence and to fight a long, hard war for freedom. Their action was complicated by the apathy and even the antagonism of many Americans. Even with independence won, the thirteen quarreling states were hardly a nation; again, through the actions of a few farsighted and devoted individuals, the radical idea of a true republic, guaranteeing rights to its citizens through a strongly worded constitution, took form. With perseverance and initiative, a relatively small group of patriots laid the foundations for American greatness.

As the nation grew from its turbulent infancy, the ideals of Americanism—equality of man and fairness in opportunity—unfortunately did not develop rapidly. The pressures of expansion splintered the country into sectional interests, and angry controversy threatened the very concept of the American nation as a single, dynamic entity. The Civil War inflamed the United States as dedicated Americans fought to determine the direction of American development. The decision, gradually cemented by constructiveness, tolerance, and forgiveness of some truly statesman-like Americans, was for one America. Through the new understanding and rededication that America ultimately gained from the Civil War, the United States could expand to encompass the rich land between the Atlantic and the Pacific Oceans.

America's abundant resources, moreover, allowed her ingenious and hard-working people to build a great agricultural-industrial complex. With the increasing interdependence of all aspects of American life came the need for Civil Service and other reforms. Through the efforts of energetic and free-thinking presidents like Theodore Roosevelt and Woodrow Wilson, America became the land of fair opportunity for millions fleeing tyranny. New ideas like mass production and imaginative principles such as the initiative referendum were quickly adopted by flexible American industrial and political leaders, and the explosive growth of American economic power permitted the United States to exert an important influence upon the world's affairs. The aggressive intentions of European tyrannies could not long be ignored, however, and most Americans gave unselfishly and patriotically of their wealth and life in two world wars to destroy the threat of totalitarianism. Because of its new world-wide commitments coupled with an unparalleled economic base, America became the mightiest power in history.

American power, which will someday be vested in us, the seniors of 1963, carries grave responsibilities. Not all nations, for instance, share America's idealistic desire for world peace and the dignity of man. Exploiting the confusion in the aftermath of World War II, the Soviet Union grew to become the world's second greatest power. Soviet Russia's twisted and outmoded ideology, communism, seeks world domination by subverting men's minds. Although the fallacies of communist policies are evident in all the countries that communism controls, communism's glibly specious solutions to economic problems, however, appear expedient to impressionable, underdeveloped nations.

In the face of communism's force and vague promises, our task must be twofold. First, we can, through hard work in our careers, show the struggling new nations that only concentrated effort and free enterprise can build a strong economy. The seniors of 1963 will spread out into business, science, and the professions. The requirements of our life's work, however varied, will have some similarities. We must, for instance, achieve to our fullest capacity. We must be creative and imaginative. We must always keep our sense of moral values. By developing into full and useful individuals, we can, at the same time, show the rest of the world that only hard work can provide good living conditions.

Second, we must realize that the United States, because of its highly successful economic and social experience based upon its diversified background, is in a unique position to share its know-how and resources with less fortunate nations. The ages have blessed America with political maturity, a proven economic system, and abundant human and natural resources. Our good fortune carries the responsibility, as well as the power, to uplift men's minds and lives and to break the cycle of war and misery that communism inevitably propagates. In a stable, economically progressive world, the United States, in turn, can realize its greatest prosperity and fulfillment.

Ironically, six European nations in 1957 took the first step toward American hopes of world co-operation when they formed the Common Market, a trade organization that plans to eradicate trade barriers and to expand markets. So successful has the Common Market group been in achieving economic goals, that its members have thought of broadening its influence to attain other goals, such as the formation of a loose political-trade confederation with a central government and representatives chosen from the member states. If we can be broadminded enough to put aside old isolationist tendencies, reduce tariffs, readjust trading patterns, and accept the idea of multilateral, rather than unilateral action, the United States could extend the European step of limited co-operation and unity to include international co-operation and unity. In the framework of an economic association the United States could patiently forge an Atlantic Community of Nations, whose socio-economic and military power would attract the emerging economies of Asia, Africa, and Latin America. The communist bloc would be isolated by the unity effected by this vigorous alliance: the theories of communism would seem hollow in comparison to the actual accomplishments of energetic free enterprise because the depressed conditions upon which communism thrives would be gradually eliminated. Only America and Americans have the worldwide power, prestige, and perspective to carry such a grand plan into effect. Let us not forget, however, that Americans have not infrequently lacked tolerance, tact, and willingness to learn from others. We shall increasingly come in contact with citizens of other countries, and we must remember that these people have not always liked what they have seen of American manners, overseas and at home. Since we shall be dealing with nations which have made significant advances in science and industry, we must be open-minded and constructive in our assessments of new people and ideas.

The course that lies ahead of us is difficult, but we are in the unique position of being able to fulfill, without military force, the age-old dream of world unity. Each of us will have to support a costly military establishment and the strong stands needed to enforce our worldwide obligation. We must not fail for any selfish reason; we are all well aware of the perils of the nuclear age. The American heritage, founded on initiative, courage, perseverance, sacrifice, adaptability, dedication, and idealism has room for one more concept: international co-operation. We, as products of our proud American heritage, are as inextricably linked to our fruitful national past as we must be dedicated to our even brighter international future.

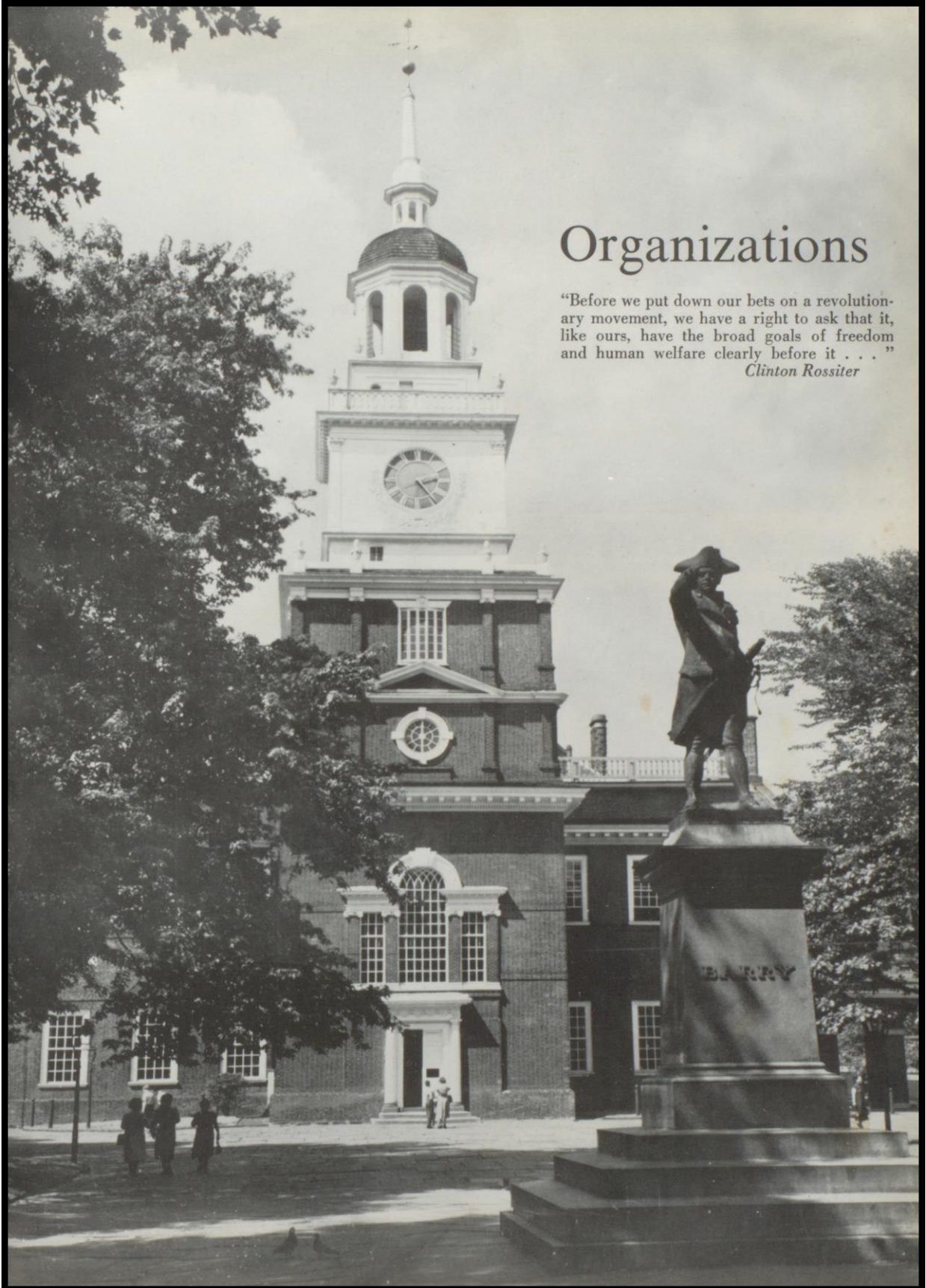

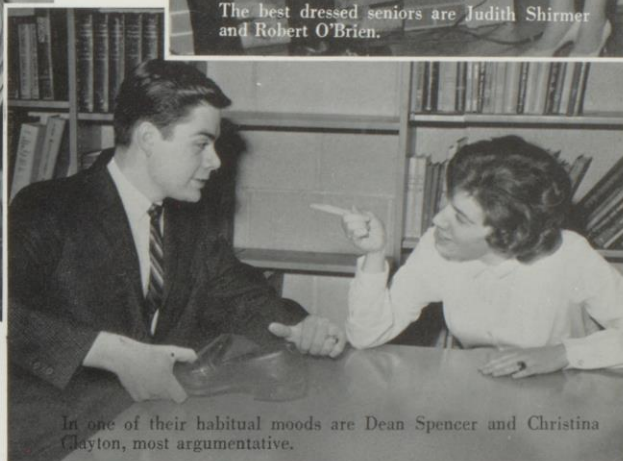

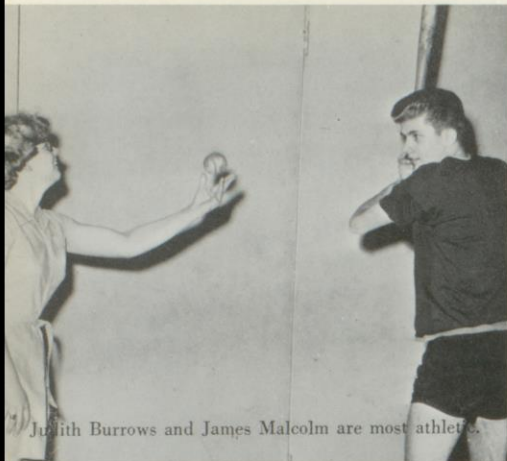

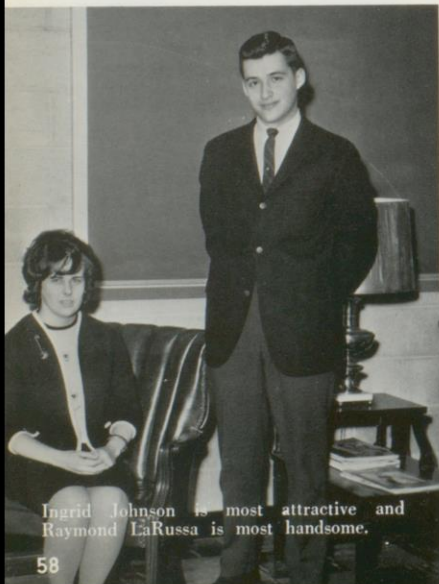

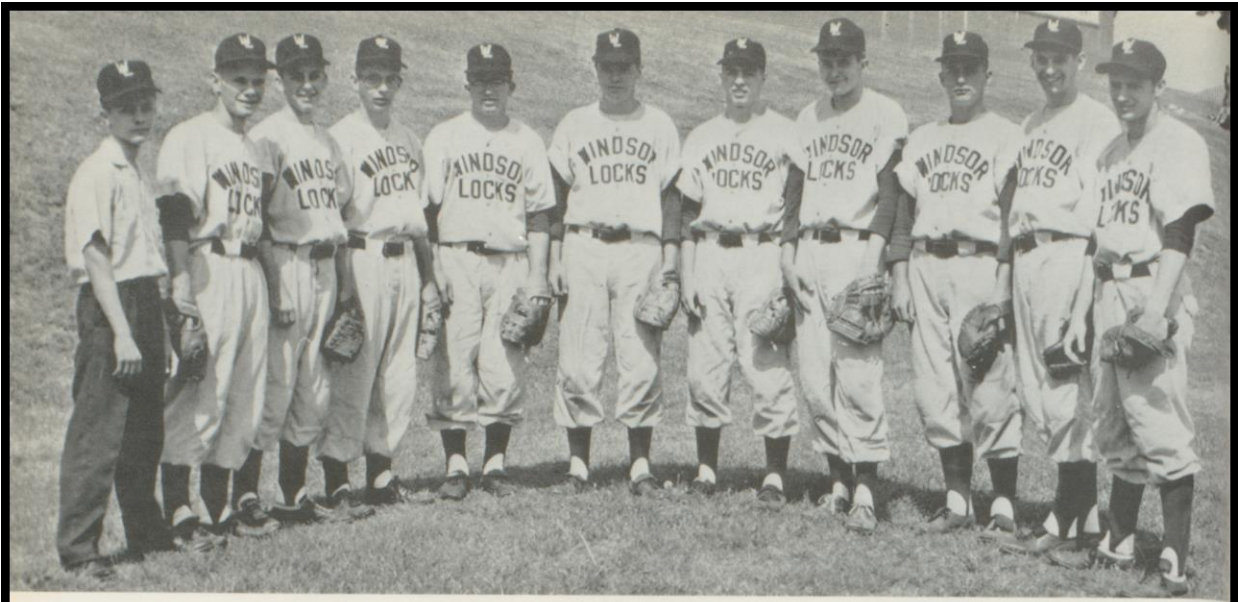

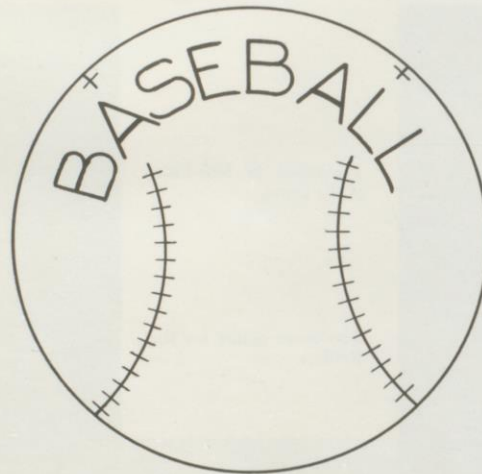

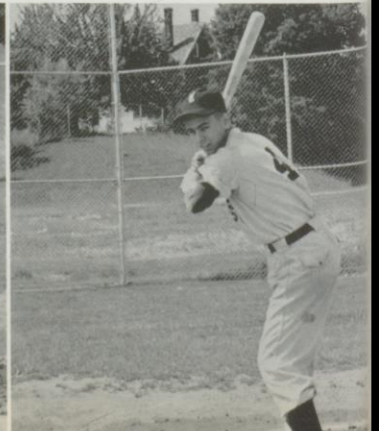
